Sister Penny Prophit

Sister Penny Prophit was born in Monroe, Louisiana. Her father was a lawyer and a graduate of the University of North Carolina and her mother was the first woman graduate of Louisiana Tech (1936). Penny began her faith journey as a Presbyterian, switching briefly to Episcopalian, and finally converting to Catholicism in 1957, the year that she graduated from high school. Her first experience with Catholicism was when she served as a Windywood (outside of Alexandria, Louisiana) summer camp counselor and accompanied the Catholic campers to Mass. Her first interactions with the Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady came when Penny's mother was a patient at St. Francis Hospital in Monroe. Penny is an accomplished pianist who turned down a scholarship to Juilliard in New York to enter the convent. She joined the Franciscans in 1958. Her undergraduate degree is from Marillac Sister Formation College (fondly known as "the West Point for nuns") in St. Louis, Missouri. She received both her master's degree and her doctorates in nursing and psychology from The Catholic University, in Washington D.C. through the National Science Foundation and National Institute of Mental Health grants for graduate and post-graduate study.



Sister Penny's professional career has been remarkable. In the late 1960s, Penny taught psychiatric nursing at Our Lady of the Lake School of Nursing when it was a diploma school. She served as a psychiatric/mental health research professor and head of graduate research in nursing at The Catholic University of America, where she directed ten doctoral dissertations. Between 1983-1993, Penny worked in a variety of positions and consultancies in Europe to help develop the discipline of nursing. At that

time, nursing was a relatively undeveloped and unrecognized academic discipline. It is now considered to be an academically sound practice discipline. Penny served in the World Health Organization's Copenhagen and Geneva offices as a consultant for nursing and behavioral science/psychology development. She also consulted for The British Council working with a medical team to Bangladesh. In her position as Visiting Professor to The Catholic University of Louvain in Belgium, she assisted in the development of the psychiatric-mental health programs, the development of the behavioral science content in the medical curricula, and the development of the administration of nursing program, all at the graduate level. Sister Penny also directed two doctoral dissertations at Louvain. She has lectured and helped with graduate program development in Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Germany, Botswana, Hong Kong, Iceland, Finland, Belgium, France, Austria, and Italy as well as throughout the United States of America. Perhaps her most challenging assignment was when she served as the Head of the Department of Nursing Studies (a position equivalent to that of dean) at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. At Edinburgh, she directed 36 doctoral dissertations and achieved the highest research grant monies of any School at the University of Edinburgh during the research grant assessment exercise for 1989-1994. Among her research interests and grant support were the areas of an experimental nurse run care of the elderly ward, education for practice excellence, adolescent suicide prevention, and assistance to find meaning in suffering and pain. In 1990, she was awarded The Catholic University of America Alumni Achievement Award and in the previous year she was given an award by Queen Elizabeth II of Honorary Welfare Commissioner for Scotland.

Sister Penny believes that the essence of nursing can best be explained by the line from Antoine de Saint-Exupery's famous novel, *The Little Prince*: "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." According to Sister

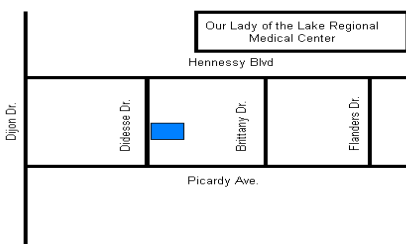

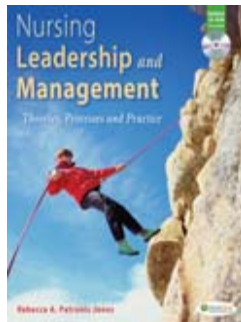

Have you heard of the proposed Office of the National Nurse? We didn't either until we completed a requirement for N430: Nursing in the 21st Century. In Mrs. Groeger's class, we were challenged to choose an issue noteworthy to the future of nursing practice and present our findings. While exploring the literature, we were intrigued by the proposed establishment of the National Nurse Office.

The Office of the National Nurse would be appointed at the federal level and work with the Surgeon General to improve public health, promote health and wellness and extend the role of nursing in preventative services. Rep. Lois Capp from California, a nurse, has sponsored bill HR 4903 which would create the office of the National Nurse. It has currently been sent to House subcommittee on health. Additionally, the National Nurse will work to advance the image of nursing, improve the working conditions of nurses, encourage nurses to become educators and will become a role model for professional volunteering and civic engagement.

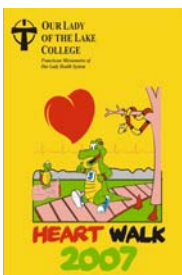

Happy Doctor's Day to the members of the OLOL medical staff! Almost 1000 physicians partner with us to care for patients and we appreciate the confidence they place in us. The relationships between doctors and hospitals can be both the most rewarding and challenging in healthcare. OLOL is fortunate to enjoy the support and leadership of physicians. Our doctors have persevered with us through Y2K, implementation of our clinical information system and its many new requirements, insurance pressures, capacity challenges, renovation and natural disasters. Even as I write this message, members of our medical staff are planning a retreat tomorrow on their personal time to discuss the challenges of city call and national best practices to help address this critical issue. Our physicians share our commitment to the community and the ministry we call the *Spirit of Healing*. Without our doctors the Lake would not be the hospital we are today and we are pleased to honor them on this special day.



Members of our medical staff have also been instrumental in helping preserve graduate medical education in Louisiana in the wake of hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Headlines have focused on the rebuilding of physical facilities but that is likely still years away. In my opinion, it is the on-going need to maintain our teaching programs that is critical. Communities are most often served by graduating clinicians who elect to practice within 150 miles of where they train. Without viable programs in South Louisiana, we will be at great risk of having enough doctors in only a matter of years. Our Lady of the Lake has partnered with both the LSU School of Medicine and Tulane to offer clinical sites for their residency programs. Our local physicians are serving in the roles of faculty, preceptors

and advisors—all above and beyond their normal busy practices. This week we hosted a GME Faculty Appreciation dinner with keynote remarks from Captain David Rutstein, MD, Office of the Surgeon General and Chief Medical Officer for the Office of Force Readiness and Deployment, US Public Health Service. The contributions of our physicians and GME programs are being noticed on a national level and it was heartening to hear accolades delivered personally by Captain Rutstein.

Congratulations are due for Assumption Community Hospital who also won a 2006 Louisiana Hospital Quality Award at the Bronze Level. I regret not being aware of that honor at "press time" last week. St. Francis Medical Center and St. Elizabeth Hospital were also recognized at the Silver Level for this same award. In addition, St. Elizabeth has been notified it is the recipient of the Louisiana Quality Foundation's Louisiana Excellence Performance Award at Level II in recognition of their maturing quality program. Congratulations again to ACH and our sister facilities for these impressive accomplishments.

Progress continues with Vision 2020 as we re-open the A Halls on floors 4, 5 and 6. Blessings were held today with team members on these units and we look forward to final approval from DHH shortly so that these new rooms will be available for patient care. In a busy day and week, it is good to pause with co-workers for a moment of reflection and shared purpose. Through prayer, together we thank God for our blessings, the gifts and talents of each person who makes our hospital run, and the future of our ministry. I doubt it is coincidental that we will begin Holy Week with this renewed focus on the healing ministry of Jesus Christ. My prayers continue for each of you as we take this important journey together.

Subject: "Madonna in Prayer"

The art image you see on the "auto-login" computers in the computer labs and student lounges is by Giovanni Battista Salvi, an Italian painter known by the name of his town of birth - Sassoferrato - and active in nearby Urbino and other cities of central Italy, notably Rome (where he was a pupil of Domenichino) and Perugia. He did some portraits but specialized in religious works painted in an extremely sweet, almost Peruginesque style. They are very clearly drawn and pure in colouring and totally un-Baroque in feeling - indeed they have a deliberately archaic quality that brings the paintings of the Nazarenes (a group of young, idealistic German painters of the early 19th century) to mind.

Little is known of Sassoferrato's life (in the 18th century it was evidently generally believed he was a contemporary of Raphael) and few of his pictures are dated or datable; they seem to have been in great demand, however, as his compositions often exist in numerous very similar versions. Most of them were presumably done for private collectors, as few are in churches. Examples of his work are in many galleries and a fine collection of his drawings (virtually his entire surviving output as a draughtsman) is in the Royal Library at Windsor Castle. (*The Web Gallery*).
