## OUR LADY OF THE LAKE ANNOUNCES NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Baton Rouge, LA – Our Lady of the Lake Regional Medical Center has announced that K. Scott Wester has been appointed as the new Chief Executive Officer. The announcement was made by Sister Barbara Arceneaux, Provincial for the Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady, sponsors for the health ministry. Wester will assume his new role not later than March 17, 2008.

Wester joins OLOL after serving for the last four years as President/Chief Executive Officer of St. Francis Medical Center in Monroe, Louisiana. Prior to his appointment at St. Francis, Wester served as President/Chief Executive Officer of St. Elizabeth Hospital in Gonzales, at the time a wholly owned subsidiary of Our Lady of the Lake.

“Scott Wester is everything we had envisioned when we began this important national search. His qualifications have earned him the top spot in this exhaustive professional process that began with over 800 potential candidates. 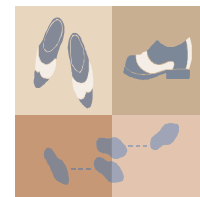

## Tobacco Free-Living Pre-Survey Findings

There were 361 students who responded to the Tobacco Free Living pre-survey randomly distributed to students over the past few weeks. From this survey at Our Lady of the Lake College, of them 15 percent are smokers. Some other findings from the pre-survey at our college are as follows.

1.) Although 45 percent of the respondents were between the ages of 18 and 21 years old, they were not the ones most likely to smoke. Only 32 percent of the respondents were 22 to 28 years old, but comprised of 43 percent of the smokers.

2.) Nearly 17 percent of the smokers replied that they had started smoking within the last two years, and 28 percent admitted that they started while in college.

4.) Of those who smoked, 68.5 percent want to quit smoking, and nearly 76 percent had tried before to quit.

5.) It was more likely that those who smoke have a spouse, boyfriend or someone close to them who smokes, compared to non-smokers (87 percent and 50 percent, respectively).

5.) The most common reasons for smoking are to relieve stress and habit, accounting for nearly 75 percent of the responses. However, 15 percent admit it is for social reasons, with the remainder either not

sure or because they like it.

6.) Both, smokers and nonsmokers would be angry, upset or disappointed if their hypothetical 14 year old child was caught smoking. More smokers than nonsmokers

stated that they would talk with the child, with many smokers stating that they feared long-term effects of smoking on their child and the difficulty the child would have to quit.

**Isaiah 43:16 and 18-19**

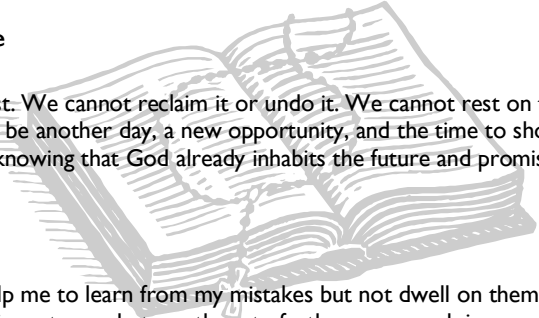

# Experts discuss aid for veterans

A group of government and private-sector experts on disability gathered Friday at Southern University to discuss how to better help disabled war veterans after they return home from Iraq and Afghanistan.

"All the rehabilitation professionals are frustrated that we are not doing enough," said Madan Kundu, chair of Southern's Department of Rehabilitation and Disability Studies, which hosted the event.

"We are spending billions of dollars in the warfront, but when the veterans are coming back we are not providing adequate services that they need to integrate into society," Kundu said.

Local psychologist Darlyne Nemeth discussed the impacts and treatments for traumatic brain injuries caused by blasts from explosions, which some experts have called the signature injury of the Iraq war.

Nemeth said returning soldiers who have suffered a traumatic

brain injury, or TBI, need easier access to private outpatient rehabilitation services.

Nemeth, a clinical and neuropsychologist and a delegate to the United Nations, said there is a "huge gap" between initial treatment for severe battlefield injuries and subsequent treatments for less-obvious brain injuries such as a TBI.

Soldiers "are not getting the help they need because they don't know how to access it," she said.

She said blast traumatic brain injuries are often overlooked because they are difficult to detect and underreported by soldiers. Most soldiers don't seek treatment until their third exposure to a blast TBI, she said.

Nemeth proposes comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation for returning veterans with head injuries. The program should target veterans who have already completed basic rehab programs, she said.

# Forum on Campus Violence

On March 4, 2008, a forum on Campus Violence was presented by the Office of Health & Safety to give students, faculty and staff an opportunity to voice their concerns regarding recent events of violence on other college campuses. A panel of representatives from Security, Counseling, Health & Safety, and Administration were available to respond to concerns and suggestions. The panel was composed of :

Dr. Phyllis Simpson, Dean of Students and Director of Counseling, OLOL College

Det. Brian Higginbotham, BR Police Dept.

Col Rhonda Whittington, Tracer Security

James Lewis, Director of Security OLOLRMC

Denise Gillespie RN BSN, Director Campus Health & Safety, OLOL College

Each panelist spoke briefly on the issue of campus violence from their perspective.

Safety measures that were echoed by the panelists that are important to share with those who were unable to attend include: 1) Be aware of your surroundings. This cannot be emphasized enough. Many crimes occur because of opportunity, don't give criminals an opportunity. Remain alert during your daily activities. Before getting on your cell phone, please look up and take notice of your surroundings! 2) Report

unusual persons or activities to authorities. 3) Do not walk alone...there is safety in numbers.

There was also discussion on how and when to contact authorities. Whenever reporting

any emergency to authorities, be prepared to give the physical address of your location. The physical address of each college building can be located on the sticker on any campus telephone. Clearly if you are in immediate danger, call 911 and give the physical address of your location. To report

suspicious persons or activities, call Tracer Security at 765-8825. To report safety concerns such as lights out in the parking lot, call the Office of Health & Safety at 768-1755. If you feel stressed or overwhelmed, counseling services are available to all students and is completely confidential. To contact Dr. Simpson or counseling services staff, call 490-1620.

In addition to Tracer Security, the College campus is patrolled by off duty police officers from 7:00 p.m. - 11:00 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays. Faculty and staff have the pager number for the officers. Students may request assistance from the officer on duty though a faculty or staff member or by calling the Library circulation desk at 768-1730.

Library News You Can Use

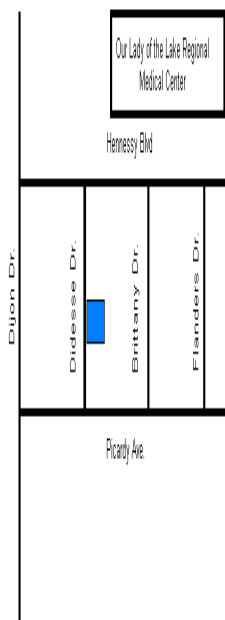

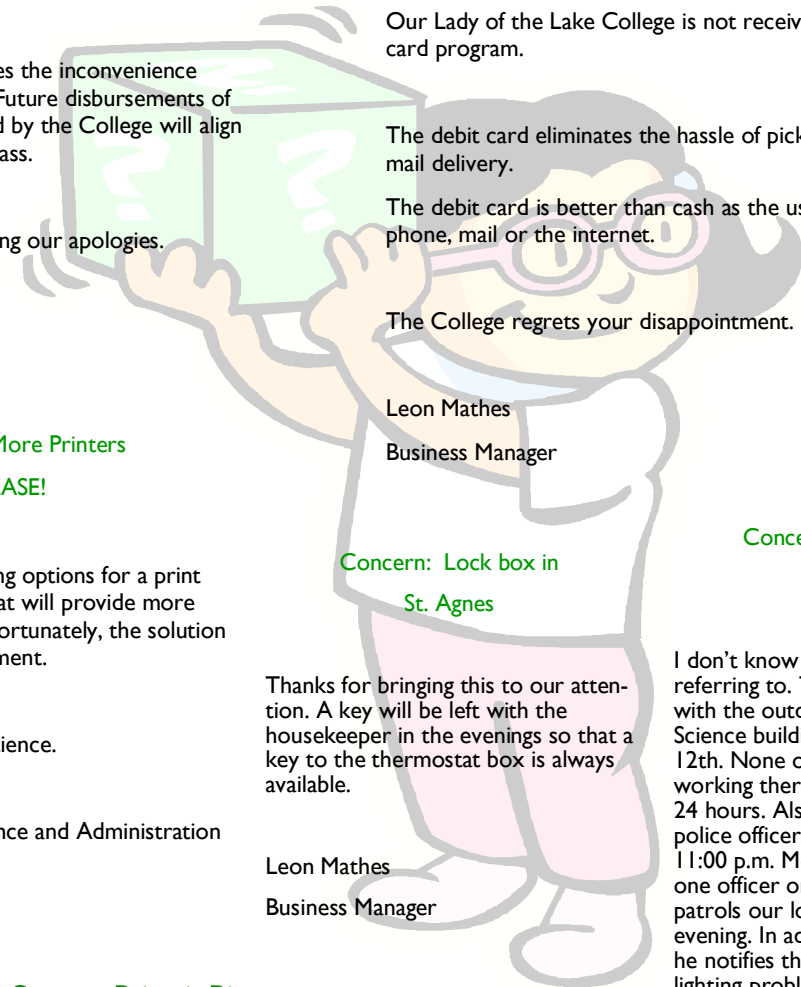

### When you have lost everything, your faith is what sustains you"

Two years ago two hurricanes devastated the New Orleans area and the Lake Charles area in southwestern Louisiana. For many people the aftermath of these hurricanes continues to inflict on them a sense of utter loss and hopelessness. Significant parts of New Orleans and other areas in southwestern Louisiana remain as they were right after the hurricanes. This fosters a sense of despair. To add to this, the insurance companies have consistently balked at paying for the re-building and repair work. The classic conundrum they present to the stupefied client is this: was the destruction caused by wind or water? The usual answer is, both! But that is not the correct answer. And, if you had insurance in the first place, you have the resources to recover for the most part. Not so the poor who are still enduring the sense of loss, isolation, and abandonment, both from society as well as country.

I have had quite a few students, here in Baton Rouge, who are evacuees from New Orleans and other devastated areas. Most have lost everything- no house, little contact with friends or neighbors who are scattered all over the country, no neighborhood, no job, and no hope. Many are still living off the generosity of family, in tiny FEMA trailers, and a little government assistance. The Road Home Program, started to help homeowners and business people start over, is so caught up in bureaucratic red tape that most people are just not getting any money from it to re-build.

The result of all this is a significant increase in suicides, mental health problems, physiological health problems, and crime. We do not have the resources to combat all of this at one time. Louisiana usually comes out at #49 or # 50 in national lists of the poorest states. This is augmented by a severe shortage of medical personnel, beginning with physicians and nurses, as well as a lack of hospitals, especially for the uninsured poor.

Yet, this gloomy picture is not the whole story. The indomitable human spirit and the Louisiana cry "Laissez les bon temps rouler" - let the good times roll- can still be heard. It can be heard in the dramatic increase of students at Tulane University, the overflow numbers of students entering the medical field in our little college here in Baton Rouge, the re-opening of some of the finest restaurants in the country, the jazz festival, and for me, the significant increase in interest on the part of my students in theology and spirituality. "When you have lost everything your faith is what sustains you"™ is the line I have heard many times in the past two years. People are grateful and continue to trust that losing everything is not the end, but just the beginning of a new life.
