Sr. Maria Helena Moreira and Sr. Wengelawit Alemshet

On Monday, May 21st and Tuesday, May 22nd Our Lady of the Lake RMC and OLOL College welcomed Sr. Maria Helena Moreira, Superior General of Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady and Sr. Wengelawit Alemshet, Council Member of Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady from the Mother House in Paris, France.

The Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady, Our Lady of the Lake's sponsoring order, is the North American province of The Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady. The Franciscan Sisters of Calais, as the order was first known, was founded in Calais, France in 1854. The order was formed out of the union of seven independent communities of the Third Order Regular Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi.

The Franciscan Sisters of Calais followed in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi (1182-1226), a gentle saint who left a life of riches to preach the gospel and serve the sick and the needy. The sisters of the Franciscan Third Order were first linked with hospitals during the mid- 13th century in France. In subsequent years, they spread out across Europe, building schools, convents, hospitals and orphanages. The centuries brought the Order many hardships, but neither wars nor religious persecution dimmed the love, faith and hope that called these women to the sisterhood. The Franciscan Sisters of Calais numbered about 800 members in 36 houses in France as well as 24 mission countries when the Sisters came to Louisiana.

In 1964, the name of the Congregation was changed from the Franciscan Sisters of Calais to the Franciscan

Missionaries of Our Lady. This change, in line with the many changes in the Catholic Church through Vatican II, brought the mission of the Franciscans into clearer focus. The new name highlighted strongly the international focus of their mission, and the Sisters were serving not only in their home countries but in many other lands as well.

The Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady have provinces and missions in France, Portugal, Ireland, Brazil, Argentina, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Madagascar, and Djibouti. They also have missions in Cologne, Germany as well as San Tome-Principe, Angola, and Haiti. Today, approximately 600 of the Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady Sisters are engaged in many works of mercy, the care of the sick, aged, orphaned, and mentally ill and others who benefit from the Franciscan Sisters' love and Christian concern.

The spirit of the congregation is rooted in Franciscan spirituality, love for Christ crucified, the Holy Eucharist, devotion to the Blessed Mother and the spirit of poverty, simplicity, faith and prayer. It epitomizes the Franciscan "way" as taught by St. Francis and his followers. It expresses the teachings of Vatican II on religious life for our day and time.

Sr. Maria Helena Moreira and Sr. Wengelawit Alemshet visited OLOL College on Tuesday. Both were very interested in the curriculums at the college with a focus on health sciences. Sr. Maria Helena felt the mission of FMOL was demonstrated in the work done by the College.

During their three week visit to Louisiana the Sisters have visited the other FMOL hospitals and gotten a taste of Louisiana hospitality.

SUMMER SUN & HEAT



Summer time is fast approaching and that always means more time enjoying the great outdoors. While fun in the sun is popular during these warm months, remember to keep your safety in mind. Too much exposure to intense sunlight can lead to the most common cancer in men and women – **skin cancer**.

“Sun proof your skin”

All skin types need protection from the sun’s rays. Doctors recommend liberal use of a sunscreen (at least SPF 15), even when it’s cloudy out. Also avoid excessive sun exposure- especially between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. when the sun’s rays are strongest – and tanning beds, which can cause skin cancer just like the sun. Check your skin monthly and report any new or changed moles to your doctor.

“Be Cool when it comes to Summer Heat”

- Don’t wait until you’re thirsty. Avoid dehydration by drinking plenty of water when it’s hot.
- Know the warning signs of heat exhaustion: headache, fatigue, dizziness, nausea, excessive thirst, clammy skin and a rapid pulse.
- Take breaks to cool off when the heat is high.
- When out in the sun, use a sunscreen with SPF 15 or more and wear clothing that minimizes skin exposure, such as wide brimmed hats and long sleeves.

Library News You Can Use

The Library has recently added two new databases to its EBSCOhost list on the website. Academic Search Complete and PsycINFO:

Academic Search Complete is the world's most valuable and comprehensive scholarly, multi-disciplinary full-text database, with more than 5,300 full-text periodicals, including 4,400 peer-reviewed journals. In addition to full text, this database offers indexing and abstracts for more than 9,300 journals and a total of 10,900 publications including monographs, reports, conference proceedings, etc. This scholarly collection offers unmatched full text coverage of information in many areas of academic study including: archaeology, area studies, astronomy, biology, chemistry, civil engineering, electrical engineering, ethnic & multicultural studies, food science & technology, general science, geography, geology, law, mathematics, mechanical engineering, music, physics, psychology, religion & theology, women's studies, and other fields.

PsycINFO, from the American Psychological Association (APA), contains nearly 2.3 million citations and summaries of scholarly journal articles, book chapters, books, and dissertations, all in psychology and related disciplines, dating as far back as the 1800s. 97 percent of the covered material is peer-reviewed. The database also includes information about the psychological aspects of related fields such as medicine, psychiatry, nursing, sociology, education, pharmacology, physiology, linguistics, anthropology, business, law and others. Journal coverage, which spans 1887 to present, includes international material selected from more than 2,100 periodicals in more than 25 languages.

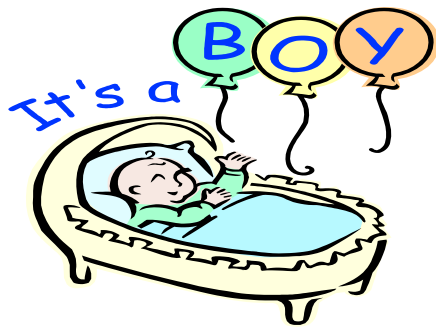

Nurse Anesthesia Students Lobby on Capitol Hill

Two nurse anesthesia students from Our Lady of the Lake College, Brian Masters and Aimee Badeaux, traveled to Washington, D.C. to attend the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists Mid-Year Assembly. This meeting presented the legislative issues which directly affect the nurse anesthesia profession. The students then went with a group of certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) to Capitol Hill to lobby Congress both in the Senate and the House of Representatives for their respective states.

The issues addressed to our legislators related to threats to educational funding. The current administration has eliminated advanced educational nursing funds in the 2008 budget. We are requesting \$4 million for Nurse Anesthesia Education. The other issue directly impacting nurse anesthesia education has to do with anesthesia teaching rules. Current Medicare anesthesia payment teaching rules discourage anesthesia education by providing higher reimbursement ratios for supervision of other anesthesia providers providing the same service. The AANA's message states that reforms are needed to ensure full funding of cases where anesthesia education is involved, and also that these reforms must apply equally to across all anesthesia providers. Both students expressed that the opportunity to attend this national meeting, as well as lobbying on behalf of their future profession, was extremely rewarding.

During our 2 days on Capitol Hill, the students met with the following legislators: Lauren Bocanegra, Legislative Assistant to Senator Mary Landrieu; Shawn Geddes, Legislative Assistant to Senator David Vitter; Sapna Delacourt, Chief of Staff to Congressman Bobby Jendal; Angelle Kwemo, Health Care Aide to Congressman William Jefferson; Kate Degraeves, Legislative Assistant to Congressman Charles Melancon; Aimee Hartaiage, Health Care Aide to Congressman Jim McCrery; Congressman Rodney Alexander; Aimee Swisher, Legislative Assistant to Congressman Richard Baker; and Mike Thompson, Health Care Aide to Congressman Charles Boustany.

Sr. Rita Maria Coco

A member of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth for 68 years, she died Friday, May 18, 2007, at Nazareth Home, Nazareth, Ky. She was 88 and a native of Helena, Ark. After her profession of vows on March 25, 1939, Sister Rita Maria served as a teacher in elementary education in Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas and Maryland. Sister also served in health ministry at St. Vincent Infirmary, Little Rock, Ark.; Mercy Hospital, Mount Vernon, Ohio; and Our Lady of the Lake Regional Medical Center, Baton Rouge. Sister received a master's degree in social work from the University of Louisville in 1974, which enabled her to expand her services in other areas. From 1979-1991, Sister served in the Family Counseling Center in Baton Rouge. She then founded the Grief Recovery Center in Baton Rouge, where she served as executive director and counselor from 1991 to June 2006. She is survived by a brother, Brother Anthony S. Coco, S.J., of Grand Coteau; a sister, Sarah J. Coco of Helena; several nieces and nephews; and her sisters in the congregation of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth

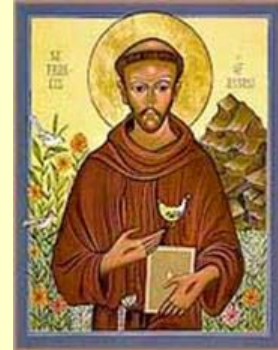

Be Prepared for a Hurricane



Hurricane season in Louisiana lasts from June 1 through November 30, with peak activity occurring in August and September. Hurricane hazards come in many forms: [storm surge](#), [high winds](#), [tornadoes](#), and [flooding](#). These hazards can strike quickly, so it is important to take steps now to prepare so that you'll be ready when a storm threatens our area.

Prepare at home by:

- Making a disaster kit that includes water, food, medications, and important documents.
- Planning for a place to go if evacuation is ordered.
- Securing your home and belongings.
- Planning for boarding pets.

The College also must take steps to ensure that we will be able to maintain operations after a storm. All leaders are strongly encouraged to:

- Review disaster procedures and plans.
- Review and update call lists.
- Make sure that batteries in flashlights, cell phones and radios are fully charged.

What We'll Do if a Hurricane Threatens

When a hurricane enters the Gulf of Mexico, OLOL will frequently monitor weather reports to determine our course of action. If the storm's path is predicted to affect our area, Administration will ensure that employees and students are kept informed as often as possible. Depending on the situation, the campus may close for a short period of time. All employees and students should monitor the media, the college website, and the College's emergency phone line for announcements.

A Hurricane **WATCH** is ordered when a hurricane is projected to pass through our area within 48-72 hours. If a Hurricane WATCH is in effect, employees should:

- Make sure that you and your family are prepared.
- Inventory supplies such as food, medications, and special need items (such as those for infants or handicapped). Try to have enough supplies on hand for four (4) days without re-supply

A Hurricane **WARNING** indicates a hurricane is projected to affect our area within the next 24 hours. If a Hurricane WARNING is in effect, the College must be prepared to assist the hospital in dealing effectively with an influx of casualties, people seeking shelter, or damage to the facility as a result of the storm. Employees should:

- Check all back-up communication systems such as radios, and cell phones to ensure systems are working properly.
- Keep your name badge with you at all times.
- Be prepared to report to the College when directed to assist with staffing Needs

Hurricane Preparedness Tips



Prepare a Personal Disaster Kit

- Place valuable papers and photographs in a water proof container
- At least one gallon of drinking water for each family member for at least three days.
- Flashlight, battery-operated radio and a two week supply of batteries
- Extra cash: banking facilities may be out of service.
- Canned goods, dry food, and a manual can opener.
- First aid supplies, extra prescription medicines, eye glasses and hearing aid supplies if needed.
- Sanitary supplies.
- Supplies for people in your family with special needs such as infants, the elderly or people with physical limitations

Be Prepared for a Hurricane cont.

If Local Officials Advise You to Evacuate

Please follow directions of local officials. Remember, evacuation routes can be closed by high winds and water many hours before a hurricane or tropical storm makes landfall. Additionally rainfall and local drainage conditions can flood evacuation routes quickly. Listen to your local radio station for updated information. As you evacuate:

- Know where you are going and leave early.
- Make sure you have a full fuel tank in your vehicle.
- Turn off gas, water, and electricity in your home.
- Lock doors and windows, leave a note on the door indicating your destination, and identifying an out-of-area point of contact.
- Keep important papers, including insurance forms, driver's licenses, property inventory, and medical information, with you at all times.
- Remember, pets are not generally allowed in shelters. If you cannot make arrangements for them in a kennel, provide a comfortable area in your home with plenty of food and clean water.*

After A Severe Tropical Storm or Hurricane

Stay out of disaster areas which could be dangerous and where your presence will interfere with essential rescue and recovery work. Do not drive unless you must. Roads should be left clear for emergency vehicles and debris removal equipment. Remember, debris-filled streets are dangerous.

- Beware of loose or dangling power lines. Many lives are lost through electrocution.
- Walk or drive cautiously. Watch out for snakes.
- Do not use water until you receive word that it is safe. Eat only foods you are absolutely sure are safe. If power has been out, food that was refrigerated or frozen may not be safe to eat.
- Be wary of dangerous or frightened animals.
- Don't light candles. Do not attempt to turn on utilities.
- Use care handling power tools, gas lanterns, generators and matches.
- Call your insurance company to file a claim if your home is damaged, ask your insurance company for financial help.
- Listen to local radio stations for official disaster relief information and instructions
